Introduction (vv. 1–3)

"Oh, give thanks to the LORD."

An appeal for us to give Him fervent praise.

We can give thanks because of God's character.

- He is <u>good</u>.
- He loves you with a <u>covenant</u> <u>keeping</u>, <u>faithful</u> love.

We can give thanks because of His <u>redeeming</u> <u>love</u>.

- He <u>rescued</u> His people who were in exile.
- He is always at work to redeem even our <u>losses</u> and <u>failures</u>.

Body of the Psalm—four scenes that end with the same chorus (vv. 4–32) Sometimes these circumstances are the results of our own foolishness and sin. But sometimes they come just as a result of living in a fallen world.

- 1. Trouble—four descriptions of dire human need.
- Those who are <u>lost</u> and wandering in the <u>desert</u> (vv. 4–5).
- Those who are prisioners (vv. 10-12).
- Those who are <u>sick</u> and <u>afflicted</u> (v. 17).
- Those who are <u>storm tossed</u> (v. 23).

#### 2. Cry

• When did they cry to the Lord? When they were in <u>trouble</u>. Why didn't they cry before they were in trouble? Because they didn't think they needed God.

If hunger brings us to our knees, it is more useful to us than feasting. If thirst drives us to the fountain, it is better than the deepest draughts of worldly joy. And if fainting leads to crying it is better than the strength of the mighty. —Charles Haddon Spurgeon
