In Luke 5, we find a discouraged, frustrated, disappointed fisherman who is about to meet with Jesus Christ.

- There is nothing wrong with washing your nets as long as you intend on using them again.
- There are too many of us living isolated Christian lives, and we're trying to tend our nets all by ourselves. The Christian life was meant to be lived in community and accountability.

3. Jesus used Simon's boat as a platform to teach the people (v. 3).

- The part of your life that you think is <u>useless</u> is probably what Jesus is going to make <u>useful</u> for His glory and kingdom.
- Sometimes in His sovereignty, Jesus will allow the platform of your life to be empty of what you want to fill it with because He needs a place to stand. If we fill it with all of <u>our stuff</u>, there won't be room for <u>His stuff</u>.
